<b>TITLE</b>	Crushing Operations
<b>GENERAL</b>	Protecting workers from injuries associated with crushing operations
<b>APPLICATION</b>	Crushing operations involve heavy equipment, loaders, conveyers and other vehicles
<b>PROTECTIVE MECHANISMS</b>	Safe job procedures Manufacturers specifications PPE Lockout procedures ERP (Emergency Response Plan)
<b>SELECTION AND USE</b>	As per job requirement
<b>SUPERVISOR RESPONSIBILITY</b>	To facilitate and/or provide proper instruction to their workers on protection requirements and training
<b>WORKER RESPONSIBILITY</b>	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. A worker must be conversant with work site operations that are part of a crushing operation.</li> <li>2. Operators must be familiar with the lock out system.</li> <li>3. Under NO circumstances proceed to attempt to rectify any electrical and/or hydraulic problems without first "locking out" the equipment.</li> <li>4. Do not cross, jump or touch any moving conveyer.</li> <li>5. Always use ladders and the provided access and exit points from all crushing equipment.</li> <li>6. Loader operators must maintain good housekeeping practices.</li> <li>7. Personnel operating heavy equipment (loaders) on the work site must refrain from using hand-held devices (cell-phones, two-way communication devices, etc.) while the heavy equipment is in motion.</li> </ol>
